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LASTING FRIENDSHIP BETWEEN MOTHERS CREATED THROUGH BABY & ME: THE STORY

OF CARLEE & ALICIA

Carlee and Alicia signed up for Baby & Me in 2014, having no idea the opportunity would result in a lasting friendship. Both women were new mothers and wanted to find parenting support in their local area. Struggle and uncertainty transformed into a fresh season of friendship, support, and helpful parenting resources.

Both mothers faced challenges that led them to search for support. Carlee navigated the rigors of motherhood—only later realizing she suffered from postpartum depression. Meanwhile, Alicia was

struggling with the changes of leaving her job outside of the home to become a stay-at-home mom.

Alicia first learned about Family Resource Center St. Croix Valley at Westfields Hospital. A Family Resource Center parent educator visited her shortly after the birth of her daughter. She shared information about Baby & Me—a group facilitated by a parent educator for parents or caregivers and babies up to one-year old. When her daughter was a few



months old Alicia knew it was time to try the Baby & Me group in New Richmond. "I signed up when my daughter was about five months old," Alicia said. "I found myself getting dressed up just to go to the doctor!"

Carlee learned about the Family Resource Center St. Croix Valley's Baby & Me group by searching online for local parent groups. She signed up for the New Richmond group to enjoy the company of other moms and create opportunities for her daughter to interact with other babies.

Baby & Me group gave Carlee and Alicia a starting point to cultivate their friendship. Through weekly Baby & Me attendance, Carlee and Alicia inspired, supported and strengthened each other. In a recent interview, Carlee and Alicia laughed that they have talked, listened, and encouraged each other every single day since they first attended Baby & Me.

Carlee shared, "I lived with postpartum for a good year before I got help. Alicia was a huge encouragement during that time for me!"

Both Carlee and Alicia now have two children and attend Family Resource Center's Play & Learn group for parents and caregivers of toddlers and preschoolers. "This group is a favorite of ours," said Carlee. "It's a great chance for parents to socialize. Parents get support from each other and from parent educators." Both Carlee and Alicia also belong to the New Richmond area Mom's Group—widening their circle of support and friendship.

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FROM THE DIRECTOR'S DESK

PARTNERING FOR STRONG FAMILIES

A recurring topic of the Director's Desk is the importance of forging public-private partnerships committed to strengthening children, families, and communities in our region. The need is great. Over the past five years, the rate of children entering out-of-home care has

increased by 200% in St. Croix County, 94% in Pierce County and 70% in Polk County. There is no one agency, individual, or program that can reverse this trend. It takes a village...

Over the last year Family Resource Center St. Croix Valley has been at the table in a multiagency collaborative to propose a comprehensive and integrated strategy to prevent child maltreatment and reduce entries into the child welfare system. The work of the partnership resulted in a proposal submitted to the US Department of Health and Human Services to implement a Family Strengthening and Child Maltreatment Prevention Continuum in our three-county service area.

Led by Wisconsin's Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention Board staff, the partnership also includes Pierce, Polk, and St. Croix County child welfare and public health agencies; United Way; ANU Family Services, University of Wisconsin- Milwaukee researchers, and Family Resource Center St. Croix Valley. If funded, the proposed Prevention Continuum would complement existing programs and resources with new evidence-based primary prevention approaches. Whatever the grant outcome, the collaborative process strengthened relationships among the participants and focused attention on research-informed strategies to enhance the overall well-being of children and families in our region.

One of Family Resource Center St. Croix Valley's roles in the collaborative is to provide professional development related to *Strengthening Families Protective Factors Framework™*. See more about that training for human services professionals in this issue of Family Matters.

PARENT EDUCATORS HELP BRING THE PROTECTIVE FACTORS TO LIFE



Family Resource Center St. Croix Valley parent educators Kristine Brede and Lori Ollig led a 2-day, 12-hour workshop series at its Baldwin office in May, called Bringing the Protective Factors to Life in Your Work. The 25 workshop participants included Family Resource Center staff and family service professionals from a variety of public and private service organizations and agencies in the region. Workshop participants included representatives from family support, healthcare, social services, public health, child welfare, education, and public safety.

The Protective Factors Framework is an approach which helps family service providers work together with families to support the healthy development and wellbeing of children. The curriculum includes an overview of the Protective Factors Framework concepts, and modules describing each of the five Protective Factors, including — 1) social and emotional competence of children, 2) knowledge of parenting and child development, 3) social connections, 4) parental resilience, and 5) concrete support in times of need.

According to the Center for the Study of Social Policy, which created the Protective Factors Framework, "Research studies support the common-sense notion that when these Protective Factors are well established in a family, the likelihood of child abuse and neglect diminishes. Research shows that

these protective factors are also 'promotive' factors that build family strengths and a family environment that promotes optimal child and youth development."

Brede, who also led a Protective Factors Workshop Series in Polk County last year, said "By embedding the Protective Factors in our work with families, we, as community service providers across a broad spectrum of fields, can reinforce the components of strong families in every interaction. Families who learn about the protective factors in one setting, a doctor's office, for example, may have an opportunity to have the concepts reinforced in another setting—such as public health or social services."

Brede and Ollig are two of 53 Certified Protective Factors Trainers in Wisconsin. Their training and certification were made possible by a grant from the Wisconsin Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention Board (CANPB) as part of its initiative to strengthen families by increasing parent, professional, and community knowledge of protective factors. Among the highlights of the training was the facilitation role played by Parent Co-Presenter Rochelle. A key component of the Protective Factors training is to include the voice of lived experience. A mother of two, who participates in Family Resource Center's home visiting program, Rochelle shared her personal parenting journey. Workshop participants were inspired by her perseverance in navigating through many years of drug addiction to achieve her goal of raising her family in a loving drug-free household with her significant other.
